PROJECT SUMMARY

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

According to a list of emigrants found at the Erfgoedcentrum Achterhoek en Liemers archives, Garrit Hendrik Kempink was born in Bredevoort on 8 October 1825. On 30 December 1856, he emigrated from Bredevoort with wife Janna Geertruid Wieskamp, born Winterswijk 16 December 1824, and two children:

1. Hendrik Willem Kempink, born Bredevoort 3 October 1851
2. Johanna Kempink, born Bredevoort 26 October 1854.¹

RESEARCH GOALS

The goal of this phase is to find out what happened to Garrit Hendrik Kempink and Janna Geertruid Wieskamp after emigration:

- What ship did they travel on?
- Where did they settle?
- Where and when did Garrit Hendrik Kempink die?
- Where and when did Janna Geertruid Wieskamp die?

LIMITATIONS ON THE PROJECT

Only records available in or from the Netherlands will be used in this first phase.

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

The Kempink family left Aalten in the Spring of 1856.² They arrived in New York on the S.S. *Epiminondas* on 26 May 1856.³

The family settled in Irondequoit, Monroe county, New York. Children born to them in Irondequoit were Delia (born about 1857), John (born about 1859), Nettie (born about 1861), Jennie (born about 1864), Dora (born about 1866), and William (born about 1870).⁴ Mother Eva Vervelde lived with them in 1860 and 1865, and probably died between 1865 and 1870.⁵

As Henry Camping and Henry Camping jr. of Irondequoit, Garrit Hendrik Kempink and Hendrik Willem Kempink were naturalized in Monroe County, New York, on 15 October 1872.⁶

Garrit Hendrik Kempink died in Irondequoit in 1899 and was buried on 5 June 1899. Janna Geertruid Wieskamp died in 1896 and was buried on 26 May 1896. They were buried at Irondequoit Cemetery.⁷

RESEARCH NOTES

ANALYSIS OF KNOWN INFORMATION

The source for the starting point information is a list of emigrants compiled in the 1980. Garrit Hendrik Kempink appears on two pages:

- Page 6 of section A, which includes emigrants extracted from the population registers of the municipality of Aalten.
- Page 13 of section B, which includes emigrants from the lists of emigrants 1846-1913 call no. 260 of the municipality of Aalten.⁸

Population registers show who lived at an address during a certain period (usually ten years), and include information about arrivals and departures. The original record should be checked to verify the starting point. Scans are available from the *Erfgoedcentrum Achterhoek en Liemers* website (<http://www.ecal.nu>).

The states of emigrants were compiled by the municipalities annually. They were based on the population registers too and supplemented with information about reasons for emigration. The lists as received by the national government are available on *FamilySearch* via an index at *Zoekakten* (<http://www.zoekakten.nl>).

December is an unusual month for emigration. Most people left around May, when contracts were up for renewal, or in August/September, after the harvest was in. December would be an uncomfortable month to travel. The original records should be verified to see if the date is correct.

Population registers were introduced in the Netherlands in the 1850s to keep track of who lived where. Like census records, they show whole households, but population registers were kept up to date. Most population registers cover a period of ten years.

The handwriting suggests that family members 1 through 4 were initially living in the house, and that Janna Geertruid Wieskamp moved in after her marriage. Their children were added after they were born. This confirms that Garrit Hindrik Kempink and his wife and two children emigrated from Bredevoort. The page also shows that Garrit Hindrik's apparent mother Eva Vervelde also emigrated to America, presumably with them.

The page does not identify family relations, so the birth records of Hendrik Willem and Johanna should be checked to make sure they are the children of Garrit Hindrik Kempink and Janna Geertruid Wieskamp. Population registers were often copied from the earlier series, so the original

birth records of Garrit Hindrik Kempink and Janna Geertruid Wieskamp should also be verified. Knowing their correct date and place of birth may help to identify them in American records.

The column for their departure only lists “Amerika,” not the date of emigration. The note in the last column indicates that the family was struck from the records on 30 December 1856. People are administratively struck from records when the municipality found out they no longer lived there. This means that 30 December 1856 was the date that the municipality discovered they were gone; not the actual date of emigration. They must have emigrated between 26 October 1854 (the birth of Johanna) and 30 December 1856. The passenger list should give a more precise date.

Abstract:

G.H. Kempink, night's watchman, age 30, Dutch Reformed, in poor circumstances, not paid taxes, emigrated with 1 wife, 2 children, 1 servant, reason: unknown, destination: North America.

This record shows that G.H. Kempink emigrated from Aalten in 1856. Bredevoort was a town in the municipality of Aalten so the information is consistent with the population register. The record only had columns for wives, children, and servants, so the servant travelling with him was probably his elderly mother. The initials, last name, family composition, age, and approximate date of emigration match the information from the population register, showing that this entry is for Garrit Hindrik Kempink.

The reason for emigration was given as “unknown.” It wasn't filled in for any of the Aalten people on the page, which suggests the municipality had not made an effort to supply the information. The fact that Kempink was listed as in poor circumstances and did not make enough money to have to pay taxes suggests that economic reasons affected their decision to emigrate. They belonged to the Dutch Reformed Church, the dominant church in the region, so religious factors are unlikely to have had an effect.

The emigration list indicates that Gerrit Hendrik Kempink was a night's watchman. That was a law enforcement position for which he would have been appointed by the municipality. The Aalten town records may have more information about that and may give an indication of his financial position and his job performance. Those records are less likely to provide information about his emigration so are not consulted at this time.

This record confirms that Garrit Hendrik Kempink was born in Bredevoort on 8 October 1825. The name of the mother matches his apparent mother in the population register.

This record shows that Janna Geertruid Wieskamp was born at the Wieskamp farm in the hamlet of Corle in Winterswijk on 16 December 1824. The date and municipality of birth matches the Bredevoort population register.

Her father wasn't able to write, which suggests she came from a poor background.

This record confirms that Hendrik Willem Kempink was born in Bredevoort on 3 October 1851. The names of the child and parents and the date and place of birth match the information from the Bredevoort population register.

This confirms that Johanna Kempink was born in Bredevoort on 26 October 1854, the same date and parents as in the Bredevoort population register.

This comparison table shows that while the names closely resemble the known family composition, the ages do not. The date of arrival, 26 May 1856, is consistent with the family appearing in the 1856 lists of emigrants and being struck from Bredevoort records by 30 December 1856. It is possible that the list was copied from another list, whereby the columns were shifted, so that the age of Eva was listed for Johanna, and the age for Johanna was listed for Hendrik Willem. They may have shaved ten years off Eva Vervelde's age to prevent her from being denied entry because of her age.

This is the only Dutch family with a Kempink and a Vervelde in this period.¹⁰ The combination of the names Kempink and Vervelde, the matching first names and order of the children and 1856 immigration date indicates that this is the correct passenger record, despite the discrepancies in ages.

The passenger record tells us that the family arrived in New York on 26 May 1856. It is most likely they settled in the United States, probably in the Mid-West like many Dutch emigrants in this era. Research in United States Federal census records may show where they settled. The 1860 census is the earliest in which they would have been enumerated. Since Garrit Hendrik Kempink was in the US by 1861, it is possible he served in the American Civil War.

The close proximity of the two families, the shared birth place of Holland, and the “jr” designation implies that Henry Camping jr. is the son of his neighbors Henry and Jane Camping.

The close matches between the names and ages of the Camping family in Irondequoit and the Kempink family in Bredevoort suggests this is the same family. The marriage record of Henry and Louisa may have more information.

No candidates for Garrit Hendrik Kempink could be found in the 1860, 1870, and 1900 US Federal censuses.¹¹

The family composition is similar to that of the 1880 household of Henry Camping jr. Daughter Ida L. no longer appears on the 1900 census, so she was apparently the third child of Louisa in the 1900 census. Henry, Louisa, and son Henry C have all aged exactly 20 years since the 1880 census. Son Walter was born after the 1880 census. The overlap in family composition proves this is the same family. The October 1852 birth date is exactly one year after the birth of Hendrik Willem Kempink in the Netherlands, a common error to make.

The census indicates that Henry was naturalized. His naturalization papers may have more information about his origins.

His parents' absence from the 1900 census suggests that they may have died before 1900. Death certificates, graves, obituaries, and probate records may have more information.

These two naturalizations on the same day in consecutive files by Henry Camping and Henry Camping jr. show that they were naturalized on 15 October 1872. This must be the apparent father-and-son who were living next-door to each other in 1880.

Henry Jr.'s declaration of intent gives his birthdate as 8 October 1851, five days after the birth date of Hendrik Willem Kempink. He was naturalized a week after reaching the age of 21. He gives his date of arrival as 20 May 1856, six days before the manifest.

Henry Camping's naturalization papers give us two signatures to compare to Dutch records.

Comparing the signatures shows that the names were spelled differently in the US, but that the initial H is the same in all four signatures, especially in the way the loops were formed. The “p” was written closed in Dutch but open in American records. Henry signs his name as H Camping, which has the American C and -ing but still uses the Dutch “e.” His son Henry Jr. signs as Camping. The writing of Henry sr. is close enough to that of G H Kempink that it could be the same person.

Since this family was already in Irondequoit in 1872, they were probably there in 1875, when there was a New York state census. They may have been there in 1870, even though they weren't found by searching the census records. Browsing the pages may turn them up.

This is the only family with a name similar to the Kempink family in Irondequoit in the 1875 census. “Cathrine” is not a translation of Janna or Geertruid, but I’ve seen it used before for women named Geertruid, a name that is hard to pronounce. The informant is unknown so may have been a neighbor who didn’t know her correct name or how to translate that in English. The ages of father Henry, Cathrine, and son Henry are within a year of the Dutch dates. Nettie and William were also found in the 1880 census.

This census implies that the family was in Monroe county by 1857, when daughter Delia was born.

With the exception of the first names of the wife and mother, this family composition closely resembles that of the family who left the Netherlands in 1856 and the family who lived in Irondequoit in 1875 and 1880. The informant is unknown and may not have known the women’s names.

The family composition resembles that of the Dutch Kempink family. The ages are all rounded off, suggesting the informant did not have personal knowledge. That would also explain why the born place of the oldest two children was given as New York rather than Holland. The presence of a mother Eve suggests this is the correct family.

This family composition only slightly resembles the family in the 1860, 1865, and 1875 census records. The ages are way off. But this is the only family that even remotely resembles the family in the 1870 census, which was browsed page-by-page. In 1875, the Henry Campana family also lived next-door to Egbert Coy.

With the exception of the 1870 census, the overlap in family compositions (names, ages) between all these different sources supports the conclusion that it's the same family. The 1870 census has too many discrepancies to say with certainty that this is the correct family, despite the neighbor being the same.

The grave has the following inscription:

CAMPING

Jennie 1825-1896

Garret 1824-1899

William 1870-1887

The memorial identifies him as Garret Henry Camping, born 1824, died 1899, buried at Irondequoit Cemetery at plot OS0934.

The style of the grave looks to modern to date from the 1800s, so it is possible that this is a later stone.

The birth years of Jennie and Garret are reversed from the Dutch records, which showed Jennie was a year older and born in 1824 while Garret was born in 1825. This grave shows his name as Garret while other US sources showed his name as Henry. His full Dutch name was Garrit Hendrik so he may have gone by Garrit/Garret in private while using the easier to pronounce name Henry in public. The William born in 1870 matches the 10-year-old son in the 1880 census. Combined with their burial location which matches the 1880 residence, this proves that these are the graves of the family in the 1880s census. The death certificates may provide more information.

This compilation shows the names that are close to the Dutch names. Garrit Hendrik Kempink is here called Gerritt Henry Camping, the only American source found so far to use both his names. His wife is called Gertrude (Jenny) Wiscamp, which is close to her maiden name of Wieskamp and fits with her Dutch names of Janna Geertruid.

This compilation is based on original records at the Irondequoit Town Clerk’s Office. It may have copy errors, but copy errors would not have led to the introduction of a name like Wiscamp unless that was in the original records. Scans of the original record should be ordered from the Irondequoit Town Clerk’s Office to verify the information.

CONCLUSION

Correlation of the known information about the family in Dutch records and New York records proves that the Kempink family settled in Irondequoit, Monroe county, New York:

- The Kempink family was recorded on a list of emigrants from Gelderland, showing they left Bredevoort in 1856. Bredevoort population registers confirmed they had left by 30 December 1856. This is consistent with the 26 May 1856 arrival of the Kempinck family on the S.S. *Epiminondas* in New York. Apart from discrepancies in ages, the family composition of the passenger list matches the Aalten family.
- Monroe county naturalization records showed that Henry Camping and Henry Camping jr. became naturalized on 15 October 1872. Henry jr. gave his date of birth as 8 October 1851, five days before the Aalten birth date of Hendrik Willem Kempink. He gave his date of arrival in the US as 20 May 1856, six days before the information on the passenger list. The signature of Henry Camping [sr.] on the naturalization records shares characteristics with the signature of Garrit Hendrik Kempink on Aalten birth records.
- Federal and state census records of Irondequoit, Monroe county, New York, show a Campbell/Cemping/Campane/Camping family there in 1860, 1865, perhaps 1870, 1875, 1880, 1892, and 1900. They show a son Henry and daughter Johanna born in Holland, a mother Eve (1860 census), and son Henry born in October 1852 (1900 census), matching the month but not the year that Hendrik Willem Kempink was born. With the exception of the 1870 census, the family composition and ages in these census records is consistent with them all being the same family.
- Garret and Jennie Camping were buried at Irondequoit Cemetery in 1899 and 1896, respectively. Compiled cemetery records call him Gerritt Henry camping, born 1825, and Gertrude (Jenny) Wiscamp Camping, born 1825. The double first names closely resemble the Dutch records. “Wiscamp” is close to “Wieskamp,” Janna Geertruid’s maiden name.
- No information was found that the Kempink family went elsewhere.

Together, this proves that the Kempink family that left Aalten in 1856 settled in Irondequoit, Monroe county, New York.

According to their grave and a compilation of cemetery records, Garrit Hendrik Kempink died there in 1899 and was buried on 5 June 1899, while Janna Geertruid Wieskamp died there in 1896 and was buried on 26 May 1896.

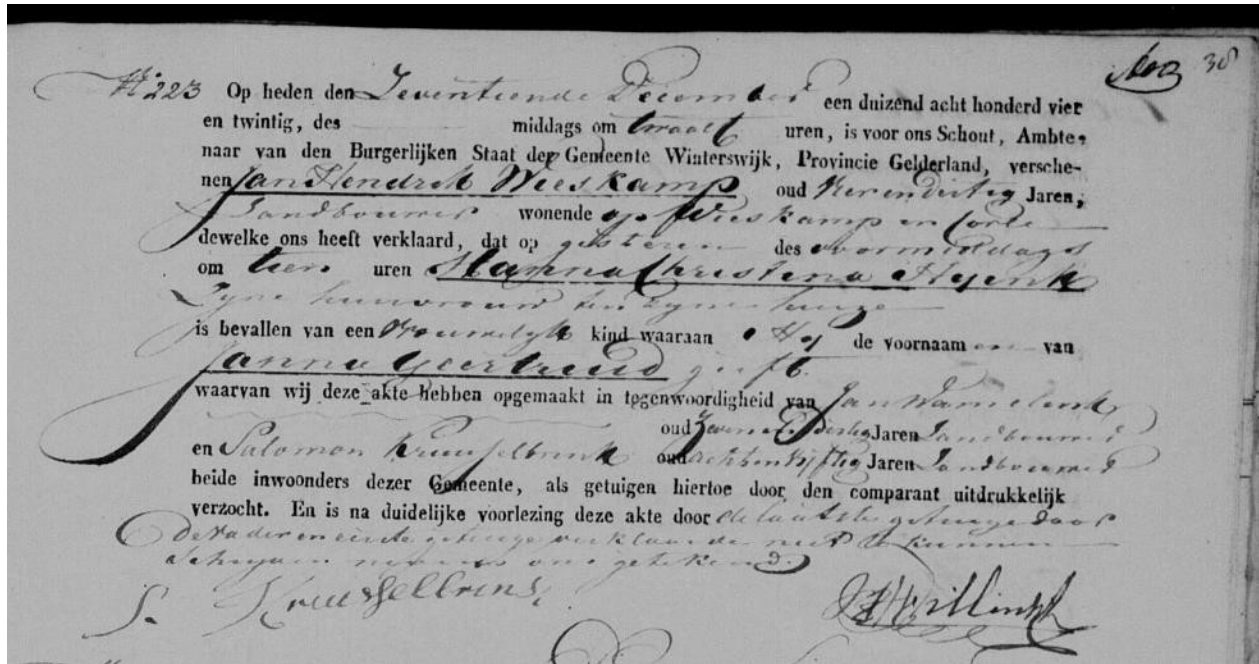

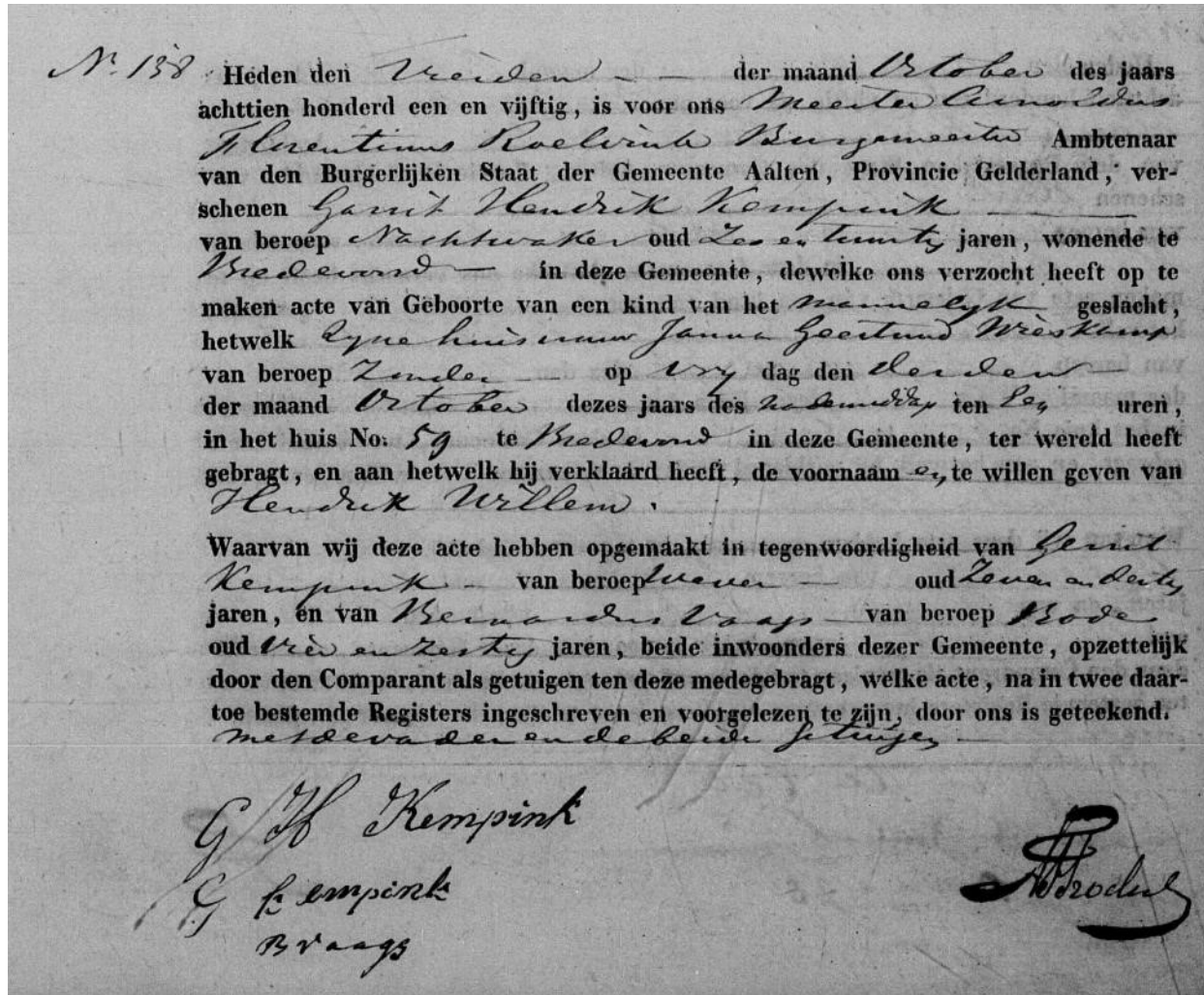
